
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THE IMPACT OF A NOVEL ONLINE MEDIUM TO DISSEMINATE PUBLIC HEALTH MESSAGES TO UNIVERSITY STUDENTS

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BACKGROUND AND AIM

- The use of technology and social media platforms has gained traction and popularity in the realms of teaching and learning of medical students in the last decade¹. ullet
- UCC HealthVine is a resource created by the UCC School of Pharmacy students. This resource uses various types of social media platforms such as Facebook[®], Snapchat[®] and Instagram[®] to share health information and promote awareness for health-related issues to the wider population of UCC and indeed, the global online community.
- At a time where students can become increasingly sexually active, they can be overwhelmed by the excessive choices of contraception available. The aim of this study was •

METHODS

• A new online medium entitled "Facebook Live", frequently utilised by musicians to promote their music at gigs, was investigated to disseminate a public health message to University students. The Pharmacist provided explanations of the different types of female contraceptive options over a 15-minute period via the medium of "Facebook Live" on the HealthVine Facebook[®] page. All 1,000 followers of the HealthVine Facebook[®] page, mostly University students, automatically received an immediate notification on their mobile phone or computer Facebook[®] app which stated the topic of the video, and that the video tutorial was then live to watch in real-time. The success of this initiative was measured through the responses of HealthVine followers (Table 1) and by thematic analysis² of comments/questions posted by viewers.

RESULTS



- The novel use of this online medium "Facebook Live" has proven to be a useful tool in the dissemination of a public health message to an University audience. It ullet
 - demonstrates the power of social media in teaching and how accessible and quickly students can respond to such an online feature. Further exploratory research is
 - required to elucidate how such technologies, online platforms and various types of social media can be extrapolated into the teaching and learning of healthcare students.
- Despite unclear regulatory guidance, this video also signifies that Pharmacists need not shy away from using social media platforms appropriately to educate others.
