




Afternoon Session: Stopping CPR

Focus Groups: Thematic Analysis

Fidelity of simulated scenarios	Multidisciplinary feedback
This is close enough to reality, the actors have been brilliant	Having social workers on faculty – their input was invaluable
The acting students were fantastic and made the scenarios very realistic and therefore more challenging	The drama students provided useful, honest feedback on our communication skills
It's different from your usual simulation scenario, having actors makes it feel very realistic like you have proper parents in front of you	The drama students picked up on mannerisms/traits we didn't know we had!
We do these scenarios sometimes with ourselves being the actors and we're AWFUL	Focus groups offered a great opportunity to reflect upon the scenarios
It wasn't that they just had a flat script, they responded to things and they got angry	The debrief sessions were excellent

Focus Groups: Thematic Analysis

Stress Management	Lack of confidence / training
Debrief: I don't think there's time, it would be great. I think we should actually be sitting down, we should actually have to do that but I can't think of a time I ever have	Better than the RCPCH bereavement course and ideal preparation for START assessment
We're so used to always being able to detach ourselves from something horrible that's happening because you can't really get upset about it or you would get nothing done	Provided good opportunity to practice communication skills in a safe environment
You just switch off and blank it out a wee bit, you're so busy	It's good to be pushed to do something that makes you feel uncomfortable sometimes, because we shy away as registrar but when you're a consultant you have no choice
If you think about it too much you get very stressed, I try not to think about it too much	We don't get the opportunity to practice these skills as a reg
Sometimes it does affect the home life as well, I've seen if I'm stressed then I take it out on my husband or my children sometimes (laughs)	This should be made compulsory for all Level 2-3 trainees

 - Buy in from other trainees
